and Politics. Natalie also earned the Bausch & Lomb Science Award from the University of Rochester.

Natalie is also Co-founder of Debate Club, Publisher & Editor of Newspaper Club and a writer for Joyful Echoes; she is also an active member of National Honor Society. Natalie is also retail floor manager at Sollecito Landscaping Nursery.

In the fall, Natalie will study CLEG -Communication, Legal Institutions, Economics and Government at American University.

The **salutatorian** for the class of 2023 is **Madison Jachim**. She is the daughter of Kristen and Paul Jachim. She will graduate with a weighted and cumulative grade point average of 100.35. Madison has earned 38 college credits; 22 college credits from Onondaga Community College and 16 college credits from Tompkins Cortland Community College. She also earned qualifying scores of four on the AP World History: Modern and AP United States History exams and a score of five on the AP Psychology exam. In May 2023, she will challenge the AP Government and Politics exam.

Madison is active in many different extra-curricular activities. She is Vice President of National Honor

Society and an active member of Character Education Club, Student Council, Yearbook Club, Key Club, Newspaper Club and Environmental Club. SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

By the time you receive this newsletter, the end of the school year will be very near and graduation celebrations will be in full bloom. It was great having a school year with the pandemic in the rearview mirror. Thank you for all your support and dedication to OCS and the Onondaga community. We had a good year and it is great being a Tiger!

I want to thank you again for passing the 2023-2024 Budget and highlight a few key points in the budget. We are happy to have the ability to have three SROs, one for each building, and additional security cameras. Plus making sure we keep an appropriate succession plan to replace our ever aging buses after they reach 10 years old or more. Keeping health and safety on the forefront, the half-time athletic trainer will keep our athletes in good physical condition, as well as work on training and lessons for injury prevention. Academically, we are also excited to increase the .5 art position to full time. The full time art position will afford us the ability to offer advanced art classes including AP Art and other college level classes. The addition of the AP course will bring our total AP class offerings to six and college credit course offerings to seventeen that students can take to earn dual credit.

Again this school year we were pleased with the After-School Enrichment programs provided to students. OCS faculty and staff planned and delivered various programs for academic, social, emotional and exercise programs for students. As you probably recall, the Federal funding was provided to boost American schools, allotting \$125 billion to K-12 school districts. We have put our funds to good use by offering after-school and summer enrichment programs. Specifically, the money is intended to address learning loss suffered by students during pandemic-induced school closures and educational disruptions. This year OCS again used Federal money to supplement not supplant district programming. More information can be found at Onondaga CSD webpage with an update, parent survey for feedback and input and expenditures to date.

Class of 2023 I want to sincerely congratulate you all on your accomplishments and wish you all the best in your future endeavors. You have made us proud over the years. In addition to the graduation celebrations, we also have a few staff reaching a milestone of their own, retiring or stepping down for a slower pace of life. Congratulations on retiring and or moving on to new phases in life. These milestones are well earned and deserved. To graduates and retirees we

FACILITIES MANAGEMENT & IMPROVEMENTS

This school year we finished up Capital Project renovations and we are excited and thankful for the upgrades to the educational spaces. This past March, we per NYS Education Department submitted our 2023 Building Condition Survey, that surveys the buildings and grounds for future planning and upkeep. Our current strategy has been to plan the capital renovations when school debt is coming off so when renovations are needed we are not adding additional debt, but keeping the debt level steady. Next Generation Learning Standards joined with 21st-century learning are a driving force for a future project; which includes safety, security, and technology updates. In this round of the building conditions survey, mechanical areas, industrial arts instructional space and grounds are being examined for renovations. One such area is the mechanical and electrical areas of the facilities. There is a phrase "end-of-life" and all of mechanical and electrical systems have end-of-life where they become outdated or more expensive to repair so it is time to replace. Some of the mechanical and electrical infrastructure equipment was not up for replacement in the last project, but will be coming up for replacement between now and the next opportune time for the project. The Industrial Arts Instructional building is aging and we will look at potential updates to accommodate our Agricultural, Technology and Trades program for the 21st Century. The renovated spaces will afford our educators the best learning environments and forge a path for our children to be better prepared for college and/or careers. If you are interested in learning about the facilities and planning, please reach out to me with any questions or join us on the Facilities Committee as we plan out the 5 year plan.

A sincere thank you to stakeholders for supporting the capital project renovations to our school facilities. Without your support we would not be able to maintain our school facilities and protect our investment.
